Relocation Nation

Despite the financial difficulties many people have experienced over the past decade, the numbers show we are still very much a nation on the move.

In 2012, the Census Bureau reported the first annual increase in "migration" between counties and states since the beginning of the Great Recession, proving Americans are keen to load up the moving truck in search of better opportunities.

Nearly 16.9 million people found a new place to call home, according to 2012 census data, with about 7 million people moving to a different state — the highest in five years. It was an increase of about 5 percent over 2010.

In a 2013 article, headlined "Americans Still Move Around More than Anyone Else in the World," the Washington Post called the United States "one of the most mobile countries in the world." With 24 percent of Americans reporting a move in the past five years, a Gallup survey showed, the U.S. charted one of the world's highest rates of mobility, joined by New Zealand, Finland and Norway. By contrast, migration in China, due to government regulations, was around 5 percent, and Mexico put up similar numbers.

WHERE ARE WE HEADED?

In a 2013 report, United Van lines noted a trend of people moving away from the northeast and Great Lakes areas, and pointed to Washington D.C. as a popular destination because of good federal government job opportunities that remained stable during the economic downturn. There also was a spike in people calling themselves Oregonians for the first time, according to Forbes.

States that typically see a large number of incoming

residents include North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida and Arizona, which tend to draw retirees, according to Forbes.

Although migration within the United States has been on the decline since the 1970s, Americans move a lot in general compared to other countries, according to the Census Bureau.

MOVE IN YOUR FUTURE?

We move for new jobs, lower housing prices, education, family and life changes, and

better opportunities in general. So how can you know if it's time to make a go of it in a new setting?
