LOOK FOR UPCOMING EVENTS

- What is the average price for a roof replacement and how long does it take?
- How much money can you save by upgrading to an energy-smart appliance?
- When is the best time to switch out your heating or air units?

Take advantage of experts who are willing to give their advice during an expo.

BECOME AN EXHIBITOR

If you have a product or service for homeowners, don't be afraid to showcase it at an expo. Check with the venue or event organizer for their requirements regarding how to become an exhibitor.

Collect Your Own Firewood

f you live on a property with trees, you can clean up while supplying your home with firewood for the winter. Analyze your property for shrubbery that is no longer thriving or causing problems because of its location.

This may not be a job you can do on your own.
According to the Tree Care Industry Association, about 580 people died in tree-trimming accidents from 2009 to 2015. If you don't feel completely comfortable with removing the timber, be sure to call in an expert.

WHEN TO CALL AN EXPERT

Sometimes, your best option is to hire a tree-removal service to take out the tree for you. They have the experience and tools to do it quick and safely. Here are a few situations in which you should always call in a professional.

- When branches are near active-power lines.
- If a fallen tree will land close to your home or other structure.
- When removal will require you to scale the tree to access limbs out of reach.

In most cases, calling an expert for a complete tree removal is your best bet. They can make sure the tree falls in the safest direction, away from buildings, people or animals. You may also need assistance when it's time to remove the stubborn stump.

CHAINSAW SAFETY

The quickest way to turn your downed trees into firewood is with a chainsaw. As helpful as they are, keep in



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mind these safety tips from the Occupational Safety and Health Administration before operating these machines.

- Wear protective equipment including hand, foot, leg, eye, face and hearing protection.
 - Never wear loose-fitting

clothing.

• Learn your machine's tendency and strength of kickbacks by practicing on smaller logs.

By taking proper precautions, a chainsaw will help you quickly collect firewood to last you all winter.

STORAGE TIPS

When considering where you will store your firewood, be sure to think with safety and convenience in mind. If you will rely on wood-burning fires to heat your home, you will benefit by keeping your stock nearby for easy access.

However, be cautious of keeping it too close to your structure. Large quantities of wood attract insects and pests like termites. The ideal location for storage would be an open-ended shed but, if you don't have access to one, an affordable option is covering it with a tarp.

Holiday Decoration Safety

or many families, a big part of the holidays is decorating their home. Bringing the festivities to life with attractive lights, decorative trees and inflatable characters is a fun way to get the entire neighborhood excited. Keep in mind these safety tips from the United States Consumer Product Safety Commission when setting the scene for the holidays.

TREE SAFETY

A holiday tree is the focal point of many displays. Regardless if you choose to use an artificial model or one fresh from the ground – there are serious safety concerns to consider.

Artificial: These trees are convenient for busy families. You may even find models with pre-hung lights, but make sure the packaging clearly states the tree is fire resistant.

Natural: Buying a fresh tree requires more attention. Make sure to find one with green needles which are hard to pull from the branch. The trunk should also be sticky with resin. This ensures the tree is healthy and not in danger of drying out. Before placing a natural tree in its stand, cut off about two inches of its trunk to help encourage absorption of water. Keep an eye on the level of fluid in the base as it is crucial to keeping the tree moist and healthy.

Trees should always be placed away from fireplaces, radiators and other heat sources.

LIGHTS

New technology makes it easier than ever to create a dazzling light show. Whether you use software to make illuminations dance to the beat of



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your favorite song or go with a more traditional display, lights can be a beautiful addition to every decoration scheme.

The commission urges us to never use more than three standard-size sets of lights per single extension cord. Before making an electrical connection, ensure each strand is free from frayed or bare wires. If you do notice signs of damage, discard the section in question. When faulty wires are placed on a decorative tree, it introduces the risk for branches to become charged, possibly electrocuting anyone who touches it. Also, make sure to turn off lights or active decorations before leaving the house or going to sleep.

With proper care and safety maintenance, your display can impress the neighborhood throughout the entire holiday season.

HIRING A PROFESSIONAL

Focus on Windows



Frame rot, a common cause of winter drafts, occurs when moisture and cold weather harm a window's housing through condensation. This can cause warping and expansion and invite pest infestations.

REPAIR OR REPLACE

Sometimes, damage to windows can be repaired, while more serious defects will require a complete replacement. Do you know how to determine when which action to take? Here are some tips from Consumer Reports to consider when deciding which route to take.

- House Built Before 1960: If your home was built during a time when lead paint was commonly used in homes, and it still has the original windows, a replacement is necessary for the health of your family.
- Windows are Rotted or Jammed: When you notice decay or jammed sashes, it's best to call in an expert. They may be able to fix the problem if it hasn't gone too far. Follow their advice when determining if replacing the window is the best option.
- They Aren't Energy
 Efficient: If you notice a draft
 coming through the frame of
 your windows, you should take
 the steps to block all entrances.
 Sometimes, it can be as easy as
 applying a new coat of caulk to
 compromised seams.

window problem, give your room a facelift by buying new blinds or curtains. An interior designer can add a touch of elegance and class to a room with affordable accessories.


Bathroom Facelift

CHECK FOR WATER DAMAGE

WINTER FIRE STATISTICS

These startling statistics from the United States Fire Administration will reveal how serious the risk of winter fires is to Americans.

- 890 people die in home fires each year.
- Winter home fires account for only eight percent of the total number of U.S. fires; but account for 30 percent of all

deaths.

• These disasters account for two-billion dollars in property losses each year.

Since three out of five fire deaths occur in properties without working smoke alarms, the USFA urges us to place detectors in and outside all sleeping quarters and test batteries at least once a month.

APPLIANCE MAINTENANCE

Home appliances can become serious fire hazards if they are not maintained properly. Consider hiring an expert to inspect and perform preventative maintenance on these appliances.

Even if fire risks aren't found, you'll feel better knowing they were given a clean

bill of health to keep you comfortable and safe throughout the cool temperatures.

Furnace: Whether you have a gas or electric model, it's crucial that a licensed HVAC professional inspects it before turning them on. They will make sure the ignition system is in good shape, replace filters to encourage airflow and

inspect for frayed wires.

Fireplace: If you use a fireplace to heat your home, make it a habit to get an inspection at least once a year. Over time, buildups of creosote can ignite and spread from the chimney to other parts of the property like an attic. The damage may not be noticed until it is too late.

on't let the cold weather stop you from showcasing an attractive garden.


