### FINDING A CAREER COACH

easiest if you can rely on word-of-mouth referrals from those you trust. When that option isn't available, spend time researching different providers who practice in your area or work remotely. Check professional networking sites like LinkedIn to find a list of potential experts. Look for endorsements from clients they have assisted and consider reaching out to former customers to learn more about their experience. You should ask about proven results, if they're comfortable to work with and how helpful their services were in finding employment.

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Once you're settled on the right professional, send them a message to discuss your goals and begin a working relationship.

### **PREPARE FOR A SESSION**

To create an effective plan, a career coach must know about you and your professional hopes. Before a meeting or appointment, ask what you can do to prepare beforehand.

Some may encourage you to draft a list of desirable outcomes, narrow down your fields of interest and explain the shortcomings you're currently experiencing in the job hunt.

### WHAT DO CAREER COACHES CHARGE?

Because career coaches vary based on experience, credentials, and skill level, costs can differ between experts. When bargaining on the price, make sure to find out if they charge an hourly fee or work as a retainer.

As you interview different experts, it's essential to avoid basing your decision on price alone. If you notice a coach charging much less than other professionals, they are likely new in the industry or lack results.

Try to hire an expert that balances value and holds an excellent track record that they can prove through firsthand referrals or feedback from previous clients.
