Psalm 2

Why do the nations rage and the peoples plot in vain?

- ²The kings of the earth set themselves, and the rulers take counsel together, against the LORD and against his Anointed, saying,
- ³ "Let us burst their bonds apart and cast away their cords from us."
- ⁴ He who sits in the heavens laughs; the Lord holds them in derision.
- ⁵ Then he will speak to them in his wrath, and terrify them in his fury, saying,
- ⁶ "As for me, I have set my King on Zion, my holy hill."

Table Discussion Questions:

- 1. What is your reaction to the word *submission?*
- 2. Who is an example of someone who knew how to practice healthy, biblical submission? How has his or her life influenced you?
- 3. What scares you about submitting the entirety of your life to God?
- 4. What does it look like for a leader, an activist, or an achiever to be submissive to God?
- 5. Is there an area of your life that is particularly hard to submit to God to say, "Not my will, but your will be done"? Why?
- 6. How does the love of Christ and promise of refuge give us faith to submit to Him in all things?

Challenge this Week:

Look over these characteristics of the discipline of submission every morning. Ask for God's grace to help you in this spiritual practice.

- · Saying, "Not my will, but your will be done."
- · Laying aside the need to be in charge or to control outcomes.
- · Willing obedience to God and those to whom you owe obedience.
- · An eager learner: humble, coachable, teachable.
- · Letting go of an autonomous, "I can do it myself," attitude.
- · Expressing a deep regard for others and what they might have to offer.
