



Reformation 500



John Calvin 1509-1564

Today we continue our month-long celebration of our Reformed heritage by commemorating the life and work of John Calvin.

A Roman Catholic in his youth, Calvin had intended to study theology, but his father determined that he should pursue a career in law, believing that to be a more lucrative path. While a law student in Paris, he came under the influence of the ideas of Martin Luther, and God brought about a drastic conversion in his life. Calvin did not seek fame or notoriety, but rather, believing God was calling him to serve the church as a scholar, attempted to withdraw from the public eye to study and

to write. In 1536, he published the first edition of one of the literary masterpieces of the Reformation, the Institutes of the Christian Religion. Addressing the book to the French monarch King Francis I, in it Calvin defended and explained the beliefs of the French Protestants being martyred, burnt alive for their faith.

Though much of Calvin's legacy derives from his writing (he wrote commentaries on almost every book of the Bible, as well as the monumental Institutes), his life's work was in large part pastoral. Later in 1536, the firebrand Genevan pastor William Farel discovered that Calvin was staying overnight in Geneva, on the way to Strasbourg, sought him out, and begged him to remain in Geneva to assist the church there. Calvin resisted, not believing himself suitable for pastoral responsibility, but Farel persisted, and threatened him with God's wrath if he did not stay. Calvin thus describes their meeting: "And after having learned that my heart was set upon devoting myself to private studies for which I wished to keep myself free from other pursuits, and finding that he gained nothing by entreaties, he proceeded to utter an imprecation that God would curse my retirement, and the tranquility of the studies which I sought, if I should withdraw and refuse to give assistance, when the necessity was so urgent." Calvin stayed, perceiving God's call despite Farel's overbearing manner.

Banished for a time from Geneva, he subsequently returned to teach and minister there for the rest of his life. His zeal for the Lord's service was so ardent that at the end of his life, despite illness so severe that he was unable to walk, he had himself carried into the church in a chair, from which he would preach and administer the sacraments.

We experience part of Calvin's legacy in our opening hymn this morning, an arrangement of a musical setting of Psalm 100 composed by Louis Bourgeois for the church in Geneva in 1551. Calvin believed that music has the power to inspire us to worship God more ardently and joyfully, and upheld singing Psalms in particular, both as a way of giving back to God praise worthy of him, and as a way for the congregation to actively participate in the worship of God.

Despite his reputation for sternness of theology, Calvin's faith was in a loving, personal God who graciously seeks His children. Perhaps he himself best summarizes his hope in the Gospel:

"We may patiently pass through this life in afflictions, hunger, cold, contempt, reproaches, and other disagreeable circumstances, contented with this single assurance, that our King will never desert us, but will give what we need, until having finished our warfare, we shall be called to the triumph."

- 4. What power has the Holy Spirit given to the Church?
