

## Reformation 500

The English Reformation in the 16th century should be dear to our hearts, as at its forefront was the desire to have Scripture and the liturgy in English.

William Tyndale is known as the first great translator of the Bible into modern English. Amazed at the ignorance of the Word of God rampant among priests, he declaimed to one clergyman, "If God spare me my life, ere many years I will cause a boy that driveth the plough to know more of Scripture than thou dost." Between 1525 and 1531, Tyndale's translations of parts of the Bible were printed overseas and smuggled anonymously into England. They were soon banned, and copies were gathered and shinggled anonymously into England. They were soon ballied, and copies were gathered and burned. Though the clergy did object merely to having an English version of the Bible, anti-Catholic prefaces to the separate books (especially to the book of Romans) also stoked their ire, as did polemical side notes (for example: in the margins of Numbers 23:8 "how can I curse whom God has not cursed?" the editor belligerently comments "the Pope can tell you how"). Tyndale was executed as a heretic in 1536.

After Tyndale's death, Thomas Cranmer, the Archbishop of Canterbury, a man of immense learning and gentle temperament, obtained King Henry the Eighth's permission to publish a complete English Bible. Miles Coverdale completed Tyndale's translation, and in 1541, a proclamation went out that this Bible in English should be set up in every parish church a proclamation went out that this Bible in English should be set up in every parish church throughout the realm. Though Henry VIII had wrested control of the church in England from the pope, political concerns were his sole motivation, and Henry's theological outlook remained firmly Catholic. Only after the king's death in 1547, with the 9-year-old Edward VI on the throne, was Cranmer able to proceed with an English-language liturgy with a more Protestant outlook. The Book of Common Prayer was published in 1549, with an act of Parliament requiring it's use for all services in England. With the exception of the reign of Mary I ("Bloody" Mary), it has been used continuously since that time, along with Coverdale's version of the Psalter. (See, for example, Ralph Vaughan Williams' settings of the texts from Psalms 84 and 90 for the anthem today). Cranmer achieved an immense beauty of language. His words have become iconic in the English-speaking world ("Dearly beloved, we are gathered together here in the sight of God and in the face of this congregation": "earth to earth, ashes to together here in the sight of God and in the face of this congregation"; "earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust").

Thomas Cranmer was executed as a heretic in 1556. "Bloody" Mary had ascended the throne, and apart from turning England back to Roman Catholicism, she resented Cranmer's complicity in the divorce of her mother, Catherine of Aragon, from Henry VIII. After two and a half years of imprisonment, interrogation, and torture, Cranmer in weakness signed a recantation of his evangelical beliefs, and was condemned to death. Given the opportunity to speak before being led to the stake, he boldly renounced his recantation, proclaiming, "forasmuch as my hand offended in writing contrary to my heart, therefore my hand shall be first punished." When the fires were lit, he thrust his hand into the flames, burning it off to a stump before the rest of his body was consumed and he died. -Dr. Nathan Davy

#### The Five Solas of the Reformation

The "five Solas" ("solus" is the Latin word for "alone" or "only") present a helpful way of summarizing the great themes of Reformation teaching about salvation—through faith alone, by grace alone, in Christ alone, on the authority Scripture alone, to the Glory of God alone. Though not stated as such until relatively recently, they clearly reflect the beliefs of the Protestant reformers.

### Sola fides - Faith alone

This is the ordinance of God, that they which believe in Christ, should be saved without works, by faith only, freely receiving remission of their sins." -Thomas Cranmer

### Sola gratia - Grace alone

'He who does not receive salvation purely through grace, independently of all good works, certainly will never secure it."
"Truly, then, we are saved by grace alone, without works or other merit." —Martin Luther

#### Solus Christus - Christ alone

We see that our whole salvation and all its parts are comprehended in Christ. We should therefore take care not to derive the least portion of it from anywhere else...In short, since rich store of every kind of good abounds in Him, let us drink our fill from this fountain, and from no other. -John Calvin

### Sola Scriptura - Scripture alone

"To a Christian man there can be nothing either more necessary or profitable, then the knowledge of holy Scripture, forasmuch as in it is contained God's true word, setting forth His glory, and also man's duty...and there is no truth nor doctrine necessary for our justification and everlasting salvation, but that is (or may be) drawn out of that fountain and Well of truth."
