

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

The following questions help us dialog with the sermon, music, and liturgy in this morning's worship service. Together, these elements provide space for reflection and prayer during personal devotions, group studies, and family worship.

1. What are you learning about praying, "Your will be done?"
2. How would you explain what we are praying when we pray, "Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven?"
3. What should our expectations be when we offer this petition to our heavenly Father?
4. As you reflect upon the history of redemption recorded in the Bible, how have you seen God answer this prayer?
5. In your own experience, how have you seen the Father answer this prayer?
6. How is the incarnation of Christ—His life, death, resurrection, reign, and promised return connected to this prayer?

Prayer Prompts:

*Use the following prompts to guide you in prayer this week: Matthew 6.9-13
"Your will be done"*

1. Praise God for His heavenly rule using the words of 1 Chronicles 29.11, "Yours, O LORD, is the greatness and the power and the glory and the victory and the majesty, for all that is in the heavens and in the earth is Yours."
2. Pray for God to renew a spirit of childlike trust in God and His will for your life.
3. Pray asking God to accomplish His redemptive purposes in the lives of those you know who are wandering, hurting, or doubting.
4. Pray giving thanks to God using the words of 1 Thessalonians 5.16-18, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."
